



Dominant Culture and Minority Culture Realities in Reconciliation

Tony Myles

Human Dignity

One of the fundamental wrestles between dominant culture and minority cultures continues to center on the Imago Dei (image of God).

Dominant cultures are afforded the privilege of shaping what it means to be full image bearers -- that is, they get to define what makes someone worthy of value, acceptance, love, etc. as a human being. And that value, acceptance, love, etc. is often rooted in cultural norms rather than biblical ones.

Minority cultures and oppressed peoples in one way or another are always reacting to that definition either by moving toward that definition and trying to fit into its parameters, reacting against it and defining the Imago Dei (image of God) on their own terms, or some combination of both.

How do Christians present to the world a more biblically faithful manifestation of the image of God?

By being a reconciled community around:

The scriptures

We need each other's eyes to see what we don't see

Church Life

We need each other's experience and wisdom to know what we don't know

Public witness

We need each other's voice to cry out for what the Lord calls us cry out for

Questions

- What minority voices are you reading from, listening to, or being discipled by that are shaping your understanding of the scriptures?
- What majority culture voices are you reading from, listening to, or being disciple by that are shaping your understanding of the scriptures?
- Where is your church walking with the poor and minorities and how is that experience impacting your church and you as an individual? What are you learning?
- What is the role of the church in the public arena? How can we speak to the issues of our day with the good news of the kingdom in the public square?

Traditional translation:

KJV Romans 13:1-2: Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. 2 Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation.

Re-translation:

Romans 13:1: Let every person be "arranged/ordered (directed) under" the existing governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which is "ordered and arranged (directed) under God, 13:2 so the one ranging in battle against the authorities is the one resisting the directing of God and the ones resisting will bring judgment on themselves"

randy nabors

new city network / mna, chattanooga, tn

Randy Nabors grew up in the inner-city of Newark, NJ, in a church that had a strong commitment to the city and its people. He served as lead pastor at New City Fellowship in Chattanooga, TN, starting in 1976. He also served as a U.S. Army Reserve Chaplain. Randy is a graduate of Covenant Seminary in St. Louis (M.Div), and has done graduate work in urban sociology and ministry at the College of Urban Life (Georgia State University) and Westminster Theological Seminary (Philadelphia). While serving as pastor of NCF, Randy was asked by Mission to North America to voluntarily serve as the Coordinator for Urban and Mercy Ministries. In 2012 Randy took a paid staff position with MNA to coordinate Urban and Mercy and to build the New City Network which connects New City congregations around the country for mutual support and encouragement. Randy and Joan have four grown children and five grandchildren as of this writing.

thurman williams

grace and peace fellowship, st. louis, mo

Thurman became the Associate Pastor of Grace and Peace Fellowship in St. Louis, MO in July of 2013. Prior to that, he was the Pastor of New Song Community Church in the Sandtown community of inner-city Baltimore for 13 years. Before that he served as the Minister of Outreach and Youth at Faith Christian Fellowship Church, also in the city of Baltimore, while completing his M.Div. at Chesapeake Theological Seminary.
